

THE ADVENTURE

It is easy to settle for the cheap counterfeit of adventure:
Three questions that can discern a God-given adventure:
First, does it you?
Second, does it you?
Finally, does it God?
In the first 11 chapters of the Bible, God sets up His redemption and rescue plan for all of humanity. It culminates with a man named Abram, and his story begins not with blessing, but with adventure
Genesis 12:1-3: 1 "Now the Lord said to Abram, "Go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the land that I will show you. 2 And I will make of you a great nation, and I will bless you and make your name great, so that you will be a blessing. 3 I will bless those who bless you, and him who dishonors you I will curse, and in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed."
DISCUSSION QUESTIONS PART 1
Abraham's adventure story contains three main elements of the adventure we are called to live

We know how Abraham's story ends, but he did not. He had to leave a known land for the unknown and trust God with the details.

Every adventure inevitably involves risk. While that can be terrifying and paralyzing,

when we add God to the equation, risks are much more manageable.





Luke 14:28-32: "For which of you, desiring to build a tower, does not first sit down and count the cost, whether he has enough to complete it? Otherwise, when he has laid a foundation and is not able to finish, all who see it begin to mock him, saying, 'This man began to build and was not able to finish.' Or what king, going out to encounter another king in war, will not sit down first and deliberate whether he is able with ten thousand to meet him who comes against him with twenty thousand?

Proverbs 3:5-6: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and lean not on your own understanding. In all your ways, acknowledge Him, and He will direct your paths."

Deuteronomy 10:11-13: "11 And the Lord said to me, 'Arise, go on your journey at the head of the people, so that they may go in and possess the land, which I swore to their fathers to give them.'12 "And now, Israel, what does the Lord your God require of you, but to fear the Lord your God, to walk in all his ways, to love him, to serve the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul, 13 and to keep the commandments and statutes of the Lord, which I am commanding you today for your good?"

The danger of the modern American church is that we can become so comfortable in our pews and our rooms that we forget our mission and our purpose. The Church needs men who are willing to go on an adventure.
